Metro Louisville government supports a program called the Community Music Partnership (CMP), jointly administered by the Metro Council and the Louisville Musicians' Union. Bands are provided to eligible organizations and groups at no-cost to perform at community events and venues such as, neighborhood block parties, senior centers, retirement communities, health fair screenings and traditional community festivals. They don't fund requests for personal grants (i.e. rent) or small business operations (i.e. admin or startup costs).

Jefferson County Cooperative Extension Service

Kentucky's two land-grant universities, the University of Kentucky and Kentucky State University, serve as partners in conducting educational programs through Cooperative Extension. The program delivery process involves Extension faculty, county agents, advisory council members, volunteer leaders and the general public.

Louisville Free Public Library

The Library's mission is to provide the people of Louisville and Jefferson County with the broadest possible access to knowledge, ideas, and information and to support them in their pursuit of learning. In support of its mission, the Library provides meeting rooms for programs and activities of the Louisville Free Public Library. The Library encourages the use of meeting rooms by community groups and organizations engaged in educational, cultural, intellectual or charitable activities. All meetings must be free and open to the general public. LFPL also has an extensive Louisville and Kentucky history collection including City Directories, legacy neighborhood plans, newspapers, and digital access to historical maps and other materials. http://www.lfpl.org

Louisville Metro Archives and Records Center

The Louisville Metro Archives storage facility has the shelf capacity to store approximately 36,000 cubic feet of boxed paper records. Approximately 32,000 cubic feet are currently in storage along with over 5,000 bound volumes of original records (including wills, deeds, marriages

bonds/licenses, etc.), over 5,000 maps, blueprints and drawings and over 4,000 rolls of microfilm. These items date from 1789 to the present. The public is invited to visit the facility during regular business hours and use their reference materials and resources for research purposes. The dedicated staff will be happy to help direct your search through the City of Louisville and Jefferson County records as well as the more recent Metro Louisville records which are housed there. https://louisvilleky.gov/government/records-management-archives

Louisville Metro Parks

Louisville's parks system includes 120 parks, four indoor lodges, four modern conference facilities, more than 60 outdoor picnic shelters, more than 170 Tennis Courts, more than 75 Baseball/Softball fields, more than 50 Football/Soccer/Multi-use Fields and over a dozen Community Centers that are available for family picnics, employee appreciation days, weddings, reunions, conferences, field trips, practices, games, special events, and more. https://louisvilleky.gov/government/parks

Louisville Metro Division of Community Forestry

The Division of Community Forestry (Division) is responsible for:

- Enforcing Louisville Metro's Tree Ordinance
- Overseeing the planting and maintenance of street trees on public property; Including the
 permitting to plant, prune, and remove tree on public property of Metro maintained streets,
 unless the property pertains to a park or parkways
- Leading the community through tree best management standards

Metro United Way

Metro United Way's 2-1-1 help referral service directs people looking for resources to help them face life challenges, often for the first time, to the appropriate service provider. Recently celebrating it's 10th anniversary, the 2-1-1 help referral service has been used by over 540,000 people in our community in ten years. 2-1-1 is available in nine counties in Kentucky and three in Southern Indiana. Neighborhood Roundtable

The Neighborhood Roundtable was created when grassroots leaders asked for a forum where they could speak frankly about their neighborhoods' issues and share best practices. To date, over 250 residents representing 15 neighborhoods have participated. Roundtable groups submit annual Neighborhoods Assessment Reports to the Louisville Metro Department of Inspections, Permits, and Licenses, that focus on vacant properties, high weeds, safety concerns, needful neighborhood parks, and unsafe sidewalks. Every Neighborhood Roundtable is an opportunity to voice your concerns about your neighborhood, and a way to learn about resources that can help your

Repair Affair mobilizes community-wide resources and volunteer support to assist these vulnerable homeowners with essential home repairs. The focus of Repair Affair is on home safety, security, weatherization and neighborhood stability. By simply installing hand rails, fixing broken steps, or making modifications to accommodate a wheel chair we can make it possible for a senior or disabled homeowner to remain independently in their own home. Best of all the assistance is completely free to the recipients. To date over 30,000 volunteers have performed over 300,000 volunteer hours and repaired over 3,000 homes in Kentuckiana.
